

Important Safety Precautions

- Never place your phone in a microwave oven as it will cause the battery to explode.
- Do not dispose of your battery in or near a fire or with hazardous or flammable materials.



- Make sure that no sharp-edged items such as animal's teeth or nails come into contact with the battery. There is a risk of this causing a fire.



- Store the battery out of reach of children.
- Be careful that children do not swallow any parts as this could cause asphyxiation or suffocation.



- Unplug the power cord and charger during lightning storms to avoid electric shock or fire.



Important Safety Precautions



- When in a car, do not leave your phone or setup the hands-free kit near to the air bag. If wireless equipment is improperly installed and the air bag is activated, you may be seriously injured.



- Do not use a hand-held phone while driving.



- Do not use the phone in areas where its use is prohibited. (i.e.: aircraft, hospital).

- Do not expose the battery charger or adapter to direct sunlight or use it in places with high humidity, such as a bathroom.

- Never store your phone in temperatures less than -15°C or greater than -50°C .



- Do not use harsh chemicals (i.e. alcohol, benzene, thinners, etc.) or detergents to clean your phone. There is a risk of this causing a fire.



- Do not drop, strike, or shake your phone severely. Such actions may harm the internal circuit boards of the phone.



- Do not use your phone in high explosive areas as the phone may generate sparks.

- Do not damage the power cord by bending, twisting, pulling, or heating. Do not use the Battery Charger plug if it is loose as it may cause a fire or electric shock.



- Do not place any heavy items on the power cord. Do not allow the power cord to be crimped as it may cause fire or electric shock.



- Do not handle the phone with wet hands while it is being charged. It may cause an electric shock or seriously damage your phone.



- Do not disassemble the phone.
- Do not place or answer calls while charging the phone as it may short-circuit the phone and/or cause electric shock or fire.

Along with the many advanced features of the CDMA system, such as greatly enhanced voice clarity, this phone offers:

- Large, easy-to-read, 9-line backlight LCD with status icons.
- Paging, messaging, voice mail, and caller ID.
- 23-key keypad.
- Menu-driven interface with prompts for easy operation and configuration.
- Any key answer, auto answer, auto retry, one-touch and speed dialing with 99 memory locations.
- Bilingual (English and French) capabilities.

Technical Details

The LG 6200 is an all digital phone that operates on both Code Division Multiple Access (CDMA) frequencies: cellular services at 800 Mhz and Personal Communication



Welcome

Services (PCS) at 1.9 GHz. Also, the LG 6200 works on Advanced Mobile Phone Service (AMPS). We call it a tri-mode phone. Since the phone operates on Cellular, PCS and AMPS, the call fail rate is less than on a conventional dual-mode or singlemode phone.

CDMA technology uses a feature called DSSS (Direct Sequence Spread Spectrum) that enables the phone to keep communication from being crossed and to use one frequency channel by multiple users in the same specific area. This results in a 10-fold capacity increase when compared with analog mode. In addition, features such as soft / softer handoff, hard Handoff, and dynamic RF power control technologies combine to reduce call interruptions. The Cellular and PCS CDMA networks consist of MSO (Mobile Switching Office), BSC (Base Station Controller), BTS (Base Station Transmission System), and MS (Mobile Station). The following table lists some major CDMA standards.

1xRTT system receives twice as many subscribers in the wireless section as IS-95. Its battery life is twice as long as IS-95. High-speed data transmission is also possible.

This device was tested for typical use with the back of the phone kept 3/4 inches (2 cm) from the body. To comply with IC and FCC RF exposure requirements, a minimum separation distance of 3/4 inches (2 cm) must be maintained between the user's body and the back of the phone, including the antenna, whether extended or retracted. Third-party belt-clips, holsters, and similar accessories containing metallic components should not be used. Avoid the use of accessories that cannot maintain

3/4 inches (2 cm) distance between the user's body and the back of the phone and have not been tested for compliance with IC and FCC RF exposure limits.

Vehicle-Mounted External Antenna



Phone Overview



1. **Earpiece**
2. **Flip** Flip open the case to answer an incoming call and close to end the call.
3. **LCD Screen** Displays messages and indicator icons.
4. **Headset Jack**
5. **Left Soft Key** Use to display the function setting menu.
6. **Side Keys** Use to adjust the ringer volume in Main Menu Screen and the earpiece volume during a call.
7. **TALK Key** Use to place or answer calls.
8. **Voice Dial Key** Use for quick access to Voice Dial.
9. **Manner Mode Key** Use to set the Manner Mode (from Main Menu Screen press and hold  for about 3 seconds).
10. **Navigation Key** Scrolls through the phone's menu options and acts as a shortcut key from standby mode. (Messaging, Downloads, Find/Add Entry, and Scheduler.)
11. **Right Soft Key** Use to select an action within a menu.
12. **Side Camera Key** Use for quick access to Camera function. (Press and hold for about 3 seconds to use camera function.)
13. **END Key** Use to turn the power on/off and to end a call. Also use to return to the main menu display screen.
14. **BACK Key** Press to delete a single space or character. Press and hold to delete entire words. Press this key once in a menu to go back one level.
15. **Camera Key** Use for quick access to Take Photo menu.
16. **Alphanumeric Keypad** Use to enter numbers and characters and select menu items.

The Battery

NOTE It is important to fully charge the battery before initial use of the phone.

The phone comes with a rechargeable battery. Keep the battery charged while not in use in order to maximize talk and standby time. The battery charge level is shown at the top of the LCD screen.

Installing the Battery

To install the battery, insert the battery into the opening on the back of the phone. Put the battery cover on the battery and push it slightly upwards.

Removing the Battery

Remove the battery by pressing the upper area, and pulling the battery.

Charging the Battery

To use the charger provided with your phone:

Warning! Use only the charger provided with the phone. Using any charger other than the one included with the LG 6200 may damage your phone or battery.

1. Plug the end of the adapter into the phone's charger jack and the other end into an electrical outlet.
2. The charge time varies depending upon the battery level. The maximum charge time for a fully discharged battery is 3.5 hours.

Battery Charge Level

The battery charge level is shown at the top right of the LCD screen. When the battery charge level becomes low, the low battery sensor alerts you in three ways: sounding an audible tone, blinking the battery icon, and displaying **LOW BATTERY WARNING!** If the battery charge level becomes exceedingly low, the phone automatically switches off and any function in progress is not saved.

Getting Started with Your Phone

Turning the Phone On and Off

Turning the Phone On

1. Install a charged battery or connect the phone to LG authorized or manufactured external power source such as a vehicle power charger or hands-free car kit.
2. Press **END** for a few seconds until the LCD screen lights up.

Turning the Phone Off

1. Press and hold **END** until the display turns off.

Signal Strength

Call quality depends on the signal strength in your area. The signal strength is indicated on the screen as the number of bars next to the signal strength icon: The more bars, the better the signal strength. If the signal quality is poor, move to an open area. If you are in a building, the reception may be better near a window.

Making Calls

1. Make sure the phone is turned on. If not, press **END** for about 3 seconds.
2. Enter the phone number (include the area code if needed).
3. Press **TALK**.

If the phone is locked, enter the lock code.

Call Failed - indicates the call did not go through.

4. Press **END** to end the call.

Correcting Dialing Mistakes

If you make a mistake while dialing a number, press **BACK** once to erase the last digit entered, or hold down **BACK** for at least 2 seconds to delete all digits.

Redialing Calls

1. Press **TALK** twice to redial the last number you dialed. The last 20 numbers (dialed) are stored in the call history list and can be accessed for redial by pressing **TALK** and using the down navigation key until you reach the desired number and pressing **TALK** again.

Receiving Calls
























1. When the phone rings or vibrates, press **TALK** to answer.

NOTE If you press **END** or **CALL** (the side keys) while the phone is ringing, the ringing or vibration is muted for that call.

2. Press **END** twice to reject the call.

Screen Icons


When the phone is powered on, the top line of the LCD screen displays icons indicating the status of the phone.

 Signal strength indicator. The strength of the signal received by the phone is indicated by the number of bars displayed.	 New Messages.

Quick Access to Convenient Features

Manner Mode

Use Manner Mode in public places. When Manner Mode is set,  is displayed on the screen, the key tones are silent, and the phone is set to **Manner Mode**.

Manner Mode Quick Activation

1. From the Standby Mode, press  to **Manner Mode**.

Manner Mode Quick Cancellation

1. Press  for manner mode cancellation.

NOTE Mode changes can only be when the flip phone is OPEN.

Lock Mode

Use Lock Mode to prevent others from using your phone. When Lock Mode is set, your 4-digit password is required to use the phone.

NOTE The lock code/password is the last 4 digits of your phone number. You can change to a new password using the Security menu.

Mute Function

The Mute Function prevents the other party from hearing your voice, but allows you to hear the other party.

Mute Quick Activation

1. Select **Mute** during a call.

Mute Quick Cancellation

1. Select **Unmute** again.

Volume Quick Adjustment

Use the side keys to adjust the earpiece and ringer volumes. The upper key increases the volume and the lower key decreases the volume.

- Earpiece volume can be adjusted during a call.
Ringer volume can be adjusted when phone is idle.

NOTE Key beep volume can be adjusted through the Sounds Volume (Menu -> Settings -> Sounds -> Volume -> Key Beep).

Call Waiting

Your cellular service may offer call waiting. While a call is in progress, two beeps indicate another incoming call. When call waiting is enabled, you may put the active call on hold while you answer the other incoming call. Check with your cellular service provider for information about this function.

1. Press **TALK** to receive the new incoming call.
2. Press **TALK** again to switch between calls.

Caller ID

Caller ID displays the phone number or name of the incoming call. If the caller's identity is stored in Contacts, the name appears with the number. Check with your service provider to ensure they offer this feature.

Speed Dialing

Speed Dialing is a convenient feature that allows you to make phone calls quickly and easily with a few keystrokes. Your phone recalls the number from your Contacts, displays it briefly, and then dials it. Speed Dial Number 1 is assigned to Voice Mail by default.

Dialing Single Digit Speed Dials (from 1 to 9)

Press and hold the Speed Dial number.

OR

Enter the speed dial number and press **TALK**.

Dialing Double Digit Speed Dials (from 10 to 99)

Enter the first digit then hold the key of the last digit.

OR

Enter the first and second digits and press **TALK**.



Entering and Editing Information

Text Input

You can input and edit Greeting, Scheduler, Contacts, Notepad and Messaging.

Key Functions



Right Soft Key : Press to scroll through the following text input modes:

Abc -> T9Word -> 123 -> Symbols -> Smileys



Shift : Press to change case.

T9 text : Word -> WORD -> word

Abc text : Abc -> ABC -> abc



Next : In T9 mode, press to display other matching words.



Space : Press to complete a word and insert a space.




Clear : Press to delete a single space or character. Hold to delete words.



Punctuation : In T9 mode, press to insert punctuation in a word and complete a sentence.

Text Input Modes

There are five modes for entering text, numbers, special characters, and punctuation. In a text entry field, pressing Right Soft Key  displays a pop-up list of text modes.

T9Word (T9) Mode

Use to type text using one keystroke per letter. The phone translates keystrokes into common words by using the letters on each key and a compressed database.

Abc (Multi-tap) Mode

Use to type text corresponding to the letter on the keyguard. More than one keystroke is required per letter.

123 (Numbers) Mode

Use to type numbers using one keystroke per number.


Symbols Mode

Use to insert special characters or punctuation.

Smileys Mode

Use to insert smiley graphics. There are 36 smiley characters.

Changing Letter Case

Using T9 and Abc text input modes you can set the capitalization. Press  to reach the following:

Initial Cap (Word / Abc)

Only the first letter is capitalized and subsequent letters are lower case.

Caps Lock (WORD / ABC)




All letters are capitalized.

Lower Case (word / abc)







All letters are in lower case.

Text Input Examples


















Display the text modes and select a text mode:

1. In a text entry field, press Right Soft Key  to display text modes.
2. Press  to highlight the text input mode you want to use.
3. Press  to select the highlighted text input mode.

Using Abc (Multi-tap) Text Input

1. Press Right Soft Key  to change to Abc mode.
2. Press  to change to ABC Caps Lock.
3. Press     .
LG is displayed.

Using T9 Mode Text Input

1. Press Right Soft Key  to change to T9Word mode.
2. Press     .
3. Press  to complete the word and add a space.
4. Press         
  .
Call the office. is displayed.



Entering and Editing Information

Using the NEXT Key

After you have finished entering a word, if the word displayed is not the one you want, press **0NEXT** to display additional choices of words from the database.

1. Press **4OH** **6MNO** **6MNO** **3DEF**.

Good is displayed.

2. Press **0NEXT**.

The display gives you additional choices such as:
Home, Gone, Hood, etc.

Adding Words to the T9 Database

If a word is not in the T9 database, add it using Abc (Multi-tap) mode text entry.

1. Press Right Soft Key  to change to Abc (Multi-tap) mode.

2. Press **2ABC** **2ABC** **6MNO** **6MNO** **6MNO** **7POB**.

Bop is displayed.

3. Press Right Soft Key  to change to T9 mode to add the word Bop to the T9 database.

4. Press **BACK** to erase the existing word.

5. Press **2ABC** **6MNO** **7POB**.

Cop is displayed.

6. Press **0NEXT** **0NEXT**.

Bop is displayed.

Contacts in Your Phone's Memory

Contacts Entries

This allows you to have easy access to your most frequently dialed phone numbers. You may store up to 500 entries with up to 5 phone numbers each. Each entry may be up to 32 characters. Each phone number may be up to 48 digits.

The Basics of Storing Contact Entries



1. From Main Menu Screen, enter the phone number you want to save (up to 48 digits).
2. Scroll to **Save** and press **OK**.
3. Use **Up** to select Name entry, then press **OK**.

New Entry / Find Entry

NOTE Use **Find Entry** to add another phone number to a contact already stored in memory.

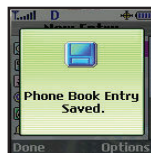


4. Enter a name for the phone number (up to 32 characters), then press **OK**.

Phone Numbers With Pauses

When you call automated systems such as voice mail or credit billing numbers, you often have to enter a series of numbers. Instead of entering these numbers by hand, you can store the numbers in your Contacts separated by special pause characters (P, T). There are two different types of pauses you can use when storing a number:

Hard Pause (P)

The phone stops dialing until you press to advance to the next number.

2-sec Pause (T)

The phone waits 2 seconds before sending the next string of digits.

Storing a Number with Pauses


1. Enter the number.
2. Highlight the **Hard Pause/2-sec Pause**, then press **OK**.
Enter the second set of numbers.
3. After you have finished entering numbers, highlight **Save**, then press **OK**.
4. Select **New Entry/Find Entry**, then press **OK**.
5. Add more Entry information and press Left Soft Key **Done**, if you want to further customize.

Searching Your Phone's Memory


The phone LG 6200 is able to perform a dynamic search of the contents in your phone's memory. A dynamic search compares entered letters or numbers against the entries in your Contacts. A matching list is displayed in descending order. You can then select a number from the list to call or edit. There are several ways to search:

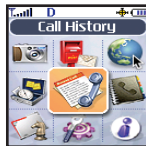

TIA Safety Information

The following is the complete TIA Safety Information for wireless handheld phones.

Exposure to Radio Frequency Signal

Your wireless handheld portable phone is a low power radio transmitter and receiver. When it is ON, it receives and also sends out Radio Frequency (RF) signals.

In August, 1996, the Federal Communications Commissions (FCC) adopted RF exposure guidelines with safety levels for handheld wireless phones. Those guidelines are consistent with the safety standards previously set by both U.S. and international standards bodies:

ANSI C95.1 (1992) *

NCRP Report 86 (1986)

ICNIRP (1996)

Health Canada, Safety Code 6, 1999.

American National Standards Institute; National Council on Radiation Protection and Measurements; International Commission on Non-Ionizing Radiation Protection

Those standards were based on comprehensive and periodic evaluations of the relevant scientific literature. For

example, over 120 scientists, engineers, and physicians from universities, government health agencies, and industry reviewed the available body of research to develop the ANSI Standard (C95.1).

The design of your phone complies with the FCC guidelines, IC Regulations (and those standards).

Antenna Care

Use only the supplied or an approved replacement antenna. Unauthorized antennas, modifications, or attachments could damage the phone and may violate FCC regulations.

Phone Operation

NORMAL POSITION: Hold the phone as you would any other telephone with the antenna pointed up and over your shoulder.

Tips on Efficient Operation

For your phone to operate most efficiently:

Do not touch the antenna unnecessarily when the phone is in use. Contact with the antenna affects call quality and may cause the phone to operate at a higher power level than otherwise needed.

Driving

Check the laws and regulations on the use of wireless phones in the areas where you drive and always obey them. Also, if using your phone while driving, please observe the following:

- Give full attention to driving -- driving safely is your first responsibility;
- Use hands-free operation, if available;
- Pull off the road and park before making or answering a call if driving conditions or the law so require.

Electronic Devices

Most modern electronic equipment is shielded from RF signals. However, certain electronic equipment may not be shielded against the RF signals from your wireless phone.

Pacemakers

The Health Industry Manufacturers Association recommends that a minimum separation of six (6) inches be maintained between a handheld wireless phone and a pacemaker to avoid potential interference with the pacemaker. These recommendations are consistent with the independent research by and recommendations of Wireless Technology Research.

Persons with pacemakers:

- Should ALWAYS keep the phone more than six (6) inches from their pacemaker when the phone is turned ON;
- Should not carry the phone in a breast pocket;
- Should use the ear opposite the pacemaker to minimize the potential for interference;
- Should turn the phone OFF immediately if there is any reason to suspect that interference is taking place.

Hearing Aids

Some digital wireless phones may interfere with some hearing aids. In the event of such interference, you may want to consult your service provider (or call the customer service line to discuss alternatives.) Optional for each phone manufacturer.

Other Medical Devices

If you use any other personal medical device, consult the manufacturer of your device to determine if it is adequately shielded from external RF energy. Your physician may be able to assist you in obtaining this information.

Health Care Facilities

Turn your phone OFF in health care facilities when any regulations posted in these areas instruct you to do so. Hospitals or health care facilities may use equipment that could be sensitive to external RF energy.

Vehicles

RF signals may affect improperly installed or inadequately shielded electronic systems in motor vehicles. Check with the manufacturer or its representative regarding your vehicle. You should also consult the manufacturer of any equipment that has been added to your vehicle.

Posted Facilities

Turn your phone OFF in any facility where posted notices so require.

Aircraft

FCC regulations prohibit using your phone while in the air. Switch OFF your phone before boarding an aircraft.

Blasting Areas

To avoid interfering with blasting operations, turn your phone OFF when in a “blasting area” or in areas posted: “Turn off two-way radio”. Obey all signs and instructions.

Potentially Explosive Atmosphere

Turn your phone OFF when in any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere and obey all signs and instructions. Sparks in such areas could cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death.

Areas with a potentially explosive atmosphere are often, but not always marked clearly. Potential areas may include: fueling areas (such as gasoline stations); below deck on boats; fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities; vehicles using liquefied petroleum gas (such as propane or butane); areas where the air contains chemicals or particles (such as grain, dust, or metal powders); and any other area where you would normally be advised to turn off your vehicle engine.

For Vehicles Equipped with an Air Bag

An air bag inflates with great force. DO NOT place objects, including either installed or portable wireless equipment, in the area over the air bag or in the air bag deployment area. If in-vehicle wireless equipment is improperly installed and the air bag inflates, serious injury could result.

Safety Information

Please read and observe the following information for safe and proper use of your phone and to prevent damage. Also, keep the user guide in an accessible place at all the times after reading it.



Violation of the instructions may cause minor or serious damage to the product.

Charger and Adapter Safety

- The charger and adapter are intended for indoor use only.
- Insert the battery pack charger vertically into the wall power socket.
- Use the correct adaptor for your phone when using the battery pack charger abroad.
- Only use the approved battery charger. Otherwise, this may result in serious damage to your phone.

Battery Information and Care

- Please dispose of your battery properly or take it to your local wireless carrier for recycling.
- The battery does not need to be fully discharged before recharging.

- Use only LG-approved chargers specific to your phone model since they are designed to maximize battery life.
- Do not disassemble or short-circuit the battery.
- Keep the battery's metal contacts clean.
- Replace the battery when it no longer provides acceptable performance. The battery can be recharged several hundred times before replacement.
- Recharge the battery after long periods of non-use to maximize battery life.
- Battery life will vary due to usage patterns and environmental conditions.
- Use of extended backlighting, MiniBrowser, and data connectivity kits affect battery life and talk/standby times.
- The self-protection function of the battery cuts the power of the phone when its operation is in an abnormal state. In this case, remove the battery from the phone, reinstall it, and turn the phone on.

Explosion, Shock, and Fire Hazards

- Do not put your phone in a place subject to excessive dust.
- When using the power plug, keep the minimum required (3ft) distance between the power cord and heat sources.
- Unplug the power cord prior to cleaning your phone, and

clean the power plug pin when it is dirty.

- When using the power plug, ensure that it is firmly connected. If it is not, it may cause excessive heat or fire.
- If you put your phone in a pocket or bag without covering the receptacle of the phone (power plug pin), metallic articles (such as a coin, paperclip or pen) may short-circuit the phone. Always cover the receptacle when not in use.
- Do not short-circuit the battery. Metallic articles such as a coin, paperclip or pen in your pocket or bag may short-circuit the + and – terminals of the battery (metal strips on the battery) upon moving. Short-circuit of the terminal may damage the battery and cause an explosion.
- Do not disassemble or crush the battery. It may cause a fire.

General Notice

- Using a damaged battery or placing a battery in your mouth may cause serious injury.
- Do not place items containing magnetic components such as a credit card, phone card, bank book or subway ticket near your phone. The magnetism of the phone may damage the data stored in the magnetic strip.
- Talking on your phone for a long period of time may reduce call quality due to heat generated during use.
- When the phone is not used for a long period time, store it in a safe place with the power cord unplugged.
- Using the phone in proximity to receiving equipment (i.e., TV or radio) may cause interference to the phone.

FDA Consumer Update



The U.S. Food and Drug Administration's Center for Devices and Radiological Health Consumer Update on Mobile Phones:

1. Do wireless phones pose a health hazard?

The available scientific evidence does not show that any health problems are associated with using wireless phones. There is no proof, however, that wireless phones are absolutely safe. Wireless phones emit low levels of Radio Frequency (RF) energy in the microwave range while being used. They also emit very low levels of RF when in the standby mode. Whereas high levels of RF can produce health effects (by heating tissue), exposure to low level RF that does not produce heating effects causes no known adverse health effects. Many studies of low level RF exposures have not found any biological effects. Some studies have suggested that some biological effects may occur, but such findings have not been confirmed by additional research. In some cases, other researchers have had difficulty in reproducing those studies, or in determining the reasons for inconsistent results.

2. What is the FDA's role concerning the safety of wireless phones?

Under the law, the FDA does not review the safety of radiation-emitting consumer products such as wireless phones before they can be sold, as it does with new drugs or medical devices. However, the agency has authority to take action if wireless phones are shown to emit Radio Frequency (RF) energy at a level that is hazardous to the user. In such a case, the FDA could require the manufacturers of wireless phones to notify users of the health hazard and to repair, replace, or recall the phones so that the hazard no longer exists.

Although the existing scientific data do not justify FDA regulatory actions, the FDA has urged the wireless phone industry to take a number of steps, including the following:

- Support needed research into possible biological effects of RF of the type emitted by wireless phones;
- Design wireless phones in a way that minimizes any RF exposure to the user that is not necessary for device function; and
- Cooperate in providing users of wireless phones with the best possible information on possible effects of wireless phone use on human health.



The FDA belongs to an interagency working group of the federal agencies that have responsibility for different aspects of RF safety to ensure coordinated efforts at the federal level. The following agencies belong to this working group:

- National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health
- Environmental Protection Agency
- Occupational Safety and Health Administration
- National Telecommunications and Information Administration

The National Institutes of Health participates in some interagency working group activities, as well.

The FDA shares regulatory responsibilities for wireless phones with the Federal Communications Commission (FCC). All phones that are sold in the United States must comply with FCC safety guidelines that limit RF exposure. The FCC relies on the FDA and other health agencies for safety questions about wireless phones.

The FCC also regulates the base stations that the wireless phone networks rely upon. While these base stations operate at higher power than do the wireless phones themselves, the RF exposures that people get from these base stations are typically thousands of times lower than

those they can get from wireless phones. Base stations are thus not the subject of the safety questions discussed in this document.

3. What kinds of phones are the subject of this update?

The term “wireless phone” refers here to handheld wireless phones with built-in antennas, often called “cell”, “mobile”, or “PCS” phones. These types of wireless phones can expose the user to measurable Radio Frequency (RF) energy because of the short distance between the phone and the user’s head.

These RF exposures are limited by FCC safety guidelines that were developed with the advice of the FDA and other federal health and safety agencies. When the phone is located at greater distances from the user, the exposure to RF is drastically lower because a person’s RF exposure decreases rapidly with increasing distance from the source. The so-called “cordless phones,” which have a base unit connected to the telephone wiring in a house, typically operate at far lower power levels, and thus produce RF exposures far below the FCC safety limits.

4. What are the results of the research done already?

The research done thus far has produced conflicting results, and many studies have suffered from flaws in their research methods. Animal experiments investigating the effects of Radio Frequency (RF) energy exposures characteristic of wireless phones have yielded conflicting results that often cannot be repeated in other laboratories. A few animal studies, however, have suggested that low levels of RF could accelerate the development of cancer in laboratory animals. However, many of the studies that showed increased tumor development used animals that had been genetically engineered or treated with cancer-causing chemicals so as to be pre-disposed to develop cancer in the absence of RF exposure. Other studies exposed the animals to RF for up to 22 hours per day. These conditions are not similar to the conditions under which people use wireless phones, so we don't know with certainty what the results of such studies mean for human health. Three large epidemiology studies have been published since December 2000. Between them, the studies investigated any possible association between the use of wireless phones and primary brain cancer, glioma, meningioma, or acoustic neuroma, tumors of the brain or salivary gland, leukemia, or other cancers. None of the

studies demonstrated the existence of any harmful health effects from wireless phone RF exposures. However, none of the studies can answer questions about long-term exposures, since the average period of phone use in these studies was around three years.

5. What research is needed to decide whether RF exposure from wireless phones poses a health risk?

A combination of laboratory studies and epidemiological studies of people actually using wireless phones would provide some of the data that are needed. Lifetime animal exposure studies could be completed in a few years. However, very large numbers of animals would be needed to provide reliable proof of a cancer promoting effect if one exists. Epidemiological studies can provide data that is directly applicable to human populations, but 10 or more years follow-up may be needed to provide answers about some health effects, such as cancer. This is because the interval between the time of exposure to a cancer-causing agent and the time tumors develop — if they do — may be many, many years. The interpretation of epidemiological studies is hampered by difficulties in measuring actual RF exposure during day-to-day use of wireless phones. Many factors affect this measurement, such as the angle at which the phone is held, or which model of phone is used.



6. What is the FDA doing to find out more about the possible health effects of wireless phone RF?

The FDA is working with the U.S. National Toxicology Program and with groups of investigators around the world to ensure that high priority animal studies are conducted to address important questions about the effects of exposure to Radio Frequency (RF) energy.

The FDA has been a leading participant in the World Health Organization International Electro Magnetic Fields (EMF) Project since its inception in 1996. An influential result of this work has been the development of a detailed agenda of research needs that has driven the establishment of new research programs around the world. The project has also helped develop a series of public information documents on EMF issues.

The FDA and the Cellular Telecommunications & Internet Association (CTIA) have a formal Cooperative Research and Development Agreement (CRADA) to do research on wireless phone safety. The FDA provides the scientific oversight, obtaining input from experts in government, industry, and academic organizations. CTIA-funded research is conducted through contracts with independent investigators. The initial research will include both laboratory studies and studies of wireless phone

users. The CRADA will also include a broad assessment of additional research needs in the context of the latest research developments around the world.

7. How can I find out how much Radio Frequency energy exposure I can get by using my wireless phone?

All phones sold in the United States must comply with Federal Communications Commission (FCC) guidelines that limit Radio Frequency (RF) energy exposures. The FCC established these guidelines in consultation with the FDA and the other federal health and safety agencies. The FCC limit for RF exposure from wireless telephones is set at a Specific Absorption Rate (SAR) of 1.6 watts per kilogram (1.6 W/kg). The FCC limit is consistent with the safety standards developed by the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineering (IEEE) and the National Council on Radiation Protection and Measurement. The exposure limit takes into consideration the body's ability to remove heat from the tissues that absorb energy from the wireless phone and is set well below levels known to have effects. Manufacturers of wireless phones must report the RF exposure level for each model of phone to the FCC. The FCC website (<http://www.fcc.gov/oet/rfsafety>) gives directions for locating the FCC identification number on your phone so you can find your phone's RF exposure level in the online listing.

8. What has the FDA done to measure the Radio Frequency energy coming from wireless phones?

The Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers (IEEE) is developing a technical standard for measuring the Radio Frequency (RF) energy exposure from wireless phones and other wireless handsets with the participation and leadership of FDA scientists and engineers. The standard, "Recommended Practice for Determining the Spatial-Peak Specific Absorption Rate (SAR) in the Human Body Due to Wireless Communications Devices: Experimental Techniques," sets forth the first consistent test methodology for measuring the rate at which RF is deposited in the heads of wireless phone users. The test method uses a tissue-simulating model of the human head. Standardized SAR test methodology is expected to greatly improve the consistency of measurements made at different laboratories on the same phone. SAR is the measurement of the amount of energy absorbed in tissue, either by the whole body or a small part of the body. It is measured in watts/kg (or milliwatts/g) of matter. This measurement is used to determine whether a wireless phone complies with safety guidelines.

9. What steps can I take to reduce my exposure to Radio Frequency energy from my wireless phone?

If there is a risk from these products — and at this point we do not know that there is — it is probably very small. But if you are concerned about avoiding even potential risks, you can take a few simple steps to minimize your exposure to Radio Frequency (RF) energy. Since time is a key factor in how much exposure a person receives, reducing the amount of time spent using a wireless phone will reduce RF exposure. If you must conduct extended conversations by wireless phone every day, you could place more distance between your body and the source of the RF, since the exposure level drops off dramatically with distance. For example, you could use a headset and carry the wireless phone away from your body or use a wireless phone connected to a remote antenna. Again, the scientific data do not demonstrate that wireless phones are harmful. But if you are concerned about the RF exposure from these products, you can use measures like those described above to reduce your RF exposure from wireless phone use.



10. What about children using wireless phones?

The scientific evidence does not show a danger to users of wireless phones, including children and teenagers. If you want to take steps to lower exposure to Radio Frequency (RF) energy, the measures described above would apply to children and teenagers using wireless phones. Reducing the time of wireless phone use and increasing the distance between the user and the RF source will reduce RF exposure.

Some groups sponsored by other national governments have advised that children be discouraged from using wireless phones at all. For example, the government in the United Kingdom distributed leaflets containing such a recommendation in December 2000. They noted that no evidence exists that using a wireless phone causes brain tumors or other ill effects. Their recommendation to limit wireless phone use by children was strictly precautionary; it was not based on scientific evidence that any health hazard exists.

11. What about wireless phone interference with medical equipment?

Radio Frequency (RF) energy from wireless phones can interact with some electronic devices. For this reason, the FDA helped develop a detailed test method to measure Electro Magnetic Interference (EMI) of implanted cardiac pacemakers and defibrillators from wireless telephones. This test method is now part of a standard sponsored by the Association for the Advancement of Medical Instrumentation (AAMI). The final draft, a joint effort by the FDA, medical device manufacturers, and many other groups, was completed in late 2000. This standard will allow manufacturers to ensure that cardiac pacemakers and defibrillators are safe from wireless phone EMI.

The FDA has tested hearing aids for interference from handheld wireless phones and helped develop a voluntary standard sponsored by the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers (IEEE). This standard specifies test methods and performance requirements for hearing aids and wireless phones so that no interference occurs when a person uses a « compatible » phone and a « compatible » hearing aid at the same time. This standard was approved by the IEEE in 2000.

The FDA continues to monitor the use of wireless phones

for possible interactions with other medical devices. Should harmful interference be found to occur, the FDA will conduct testing to assess the interference and work to resolve the problem.

Consumer Information on SAR

(Specific Absorption Rate)

This Model Phone Meets the Government's Requirements for Exposure to Radio Waves. Your wireless phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed the emission limits for exposure to Radio Frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission of the U.S. Government, and Industry Canada of the Canadian Government.

These limits are part of comprehensive guidelines and establish permitted levels of RF energy for the general population. The guidelines are based on standards that were developed by independent scientific organizations through periodic and thorough evaluation of scientific studies. The standards include a substantial safety margin designed to assure the safety of all persons, regardless of age and health.

The exposure standard for wireless mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate, or SAR.

The SAR limit set by the FCC/IC is 1.6 W/kg. Tests for SAR are conducted using standard operating positions

specified by the FCC/IC with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. Because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels to use only the power required to reach the network, in general, the closer you are to a wireless base station antenna, the lower the power output.

Before a phone model is available for sale to the public, it must be tested and certified to the FCC/IC that it does not exceed the limit established by the government-adopted requirement for safe exposure. The tests are performed in positions and locations (e.g., at the ear and worn on the body) as required by the FCC/IC for each model.

The highest SAR value for this model phone when tested for use at the ear is 0.848 W/kg and when worn on the body, as described in this user guide, is 1.23 W/kg (body-worn measurements differ among phone models, depending upon available accessories and FCC/IC requirements). While there may be differences between SAR levels of various phones and at various positions, they all meet the government requirement for safe exposure.

The FCC has granted an Equipment Authorization for this

model phone with all reported SAR levels evaluated as in compliance with the FCC RF emission guidelines. SAR information on this model phone is on file with the FCC and can be found under the Display Grant section of <http://www.fcc.gov/oet/fccid> after searching on FCC ID BEJAX5000. Additional information on Specific Absorption Rates (SAR) can be found on the Cellular Telecommunications Industry Association (CTIA) website at <http://www.wow-com.com>.

* In the United States and Canada, the SAR limit for mobile phones used by the public is 1.6 watts/kg (W/kg) averaged over one gram of tissue. The standard incorporates a substantial margin of safety to give additional protection for the public and to account for any variations in measurements.

There are a variety of accessories available for your mobile phone. Consult your local dealer for availability.



AC Adapter

The adapter, allows you to charge the battery while away from your home or office.

Two batteries are available. The standard battery, and the extended battery.
